





Summary of Investment Objective

Fulcrum Alternative Beta Plus Daily seeks to deliver a diversified source of returns to investors with a low correlation to equities, bonds and commodities. The fund is designed to capture market driven returns (or risk premia) in equity, bond, commodity and currency markets and to add value (or alpha) to these returns through proprietary active trading strategies.


The fund aims to outperform the overall hedge fund universe on a risk adjusted basis and to produce long term capital growth with low targeted volatility (6% to 8%). The fund employs several complementary risk management techniques to deliver more consistent annual returns than traditional asset classes in a low cost, liquid, transparent and regulated fund. The fund invests globally in liquid instruments in cash, currency, equity, commodity and fixed income markets, using a combination of futures, forwards, options and swaps.





¹ The daily liquidity fund launched on 1st March 2009. Performance shown prior to this date reflects the returns of the Fulcrum Alternative Beta Plus Fund (Institutional GBP hedged) which follows an identical strategy but has twice monthly instead of daily liquidity.

Performance Commentary and Investment Strategy


The Fulcrum Alternative Beta Plus Daily Fund (FAB+) returned -1.29% for the month of November, taking its year-to-date performance to +5.75%. The Fund was able to navigate the sharp increase in market volatility relatively well, in large part due to the beneficial impact of option based hedging strategies. Losses were concentrated in fixed income (-1.1%) and equities (-1.0%), while currencies (+0.6%) and commodities (+0.2%) provided significant protection.

The Fund's negative performance was primarily attributable to the risk-premia strategy (-1.3%) which had its first negative month since May. The majority of the losses came from government fixed income (-0.8%), while the remaining asset classes made small negative contributions.

The active trading strategy had a volatile month but ended broadly unchanged, as trend following in commodities, especially agriculture and precious metals, provided consistent returns, but trend reversals in currencies and equities detracted. The best performer during the month, however, was the option based hedging strategy which made substantial gains in currencies, especially the euro and Australian dollar.

Going into December, the Fund's predicted volatility is 6.7% and, as usual, it maintains hedges against significant negative market movements.



Fulcrum Asset Management is an independent asset management company founded by Gavyn Davies and Andrew Stevens in 2004 to manage assets for individuals, endowments and institutions. The partnership has 27 employees, most of whom worked together for much of their careers. Client assets are managed by the Fulcrum Investment Committee, which includes:

Gavyn Davies is Chairman of Fulcrum Asset Management and Head of the Fulcrum Investment Committee. Previously, Gavyn was Chairman of the BBC from 2001 to 2004. He joined Goldman Sachs in 1986 and was a Partner from 1988 to 2001. He was also the firm's Chief Economist over that period and Chairman of the Research Department. He was repeatedly ranked as the City's top UK and European economist in surveys of institutional investors. From 1992 to 1997, he was a member of H.M.Treasury Independent Forecasting Panel. He began as a City Economist, first with Phillips and Drew from 1979 to 1981, then Simon and Coates from 1981 to 1986. Gavyn graduated in economics from St. John's College, Cambridge in 1972. This was followed by two years of research at Balliol College Oxford. He joined the Policy Unit at 10 Downing Street as an Economist in 1974 and was an Economic Policy Adviser to the Prime Minister from 1976 to 1979.
