MANAGER COMMENTARY

Visa, the US payment firm performed well in January, the company's shares benefiting from positive market sentiment around increased cross-border spending. The firm expects international travel to return to 2019 levels by the end of 2022 versus their previous estimate of 2023. Tencent, the Chinese internet platform was also a positive contributor. The market reacted positively as the firm divested from several Chinese and Asian e-commerce businesses, reducing concerns over regulatory pressure. Taiwan Semiconductor announced earnings results during the month that demonstrated a continued robust demand environment. The company also raised longterm guidance for both revenue growth and margins.

Kingspan the Irish building materials firm shares came under pressure. The new UK government minister for levelling up, communities and housing, Michael Gove, urged insulation producers to join developers in making significant contributions to remediation costs for historical incidences of poorly designed and installed cladding systems. Masimo, US medical devices firm shares were also weak in January, this was largely down to the rotation seen across global markets away from quality companies. The company also announced preliminary results for 2021 which were largely in line with the market expectations. Nvidia, the computer systems designer was also weak, with the share off from December continuing into January.

During January the Trust received shares in JD.com, the Chinese online retailer. This was a one-off dividend from Tencent as the company made a divestment from JD.com, distributing US\$16 billion of stock to its shareholders.

Morningstar Rating for Funds

Morningstar rates funds from one to five stars based on how well they've performed (after adjusting for risk) in comparison to similar funds. Within each Morningstar Category, the top 10% of funds receive five stars, the next 22.5% four stars, the middle 35% three stars, the next 22.5% two stars, and the bottom 10% receive one star. Funds are rated for up to three time periods—three-, five-, and 10 years—and these ratings are combined to produce an overall rating. Funds with less than three years of history are not rated. Ratings are objective, based entirely on a mathematical evaluation of past performance. They're a useful tool for identifying funds worthy of further research, but shouldn't be considered buy or sell recommendations.

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
